Position Title: School Garden Assistant

Position Reports to: Garden Educator

Summary of Position:

Grow Pittsburgh's School Garden Program provides garden-based programming to K-12 schools across the Pittsburgh region. We aim to teach students to grow, cook and eat fresh food while celebrating the cultures and experiences of our students and our city. In our Learning Garden program, schools receive direct support over two years with garden builds and supplies, teaching support, teacher training, and garden oversight. After two years, schools are able to take over leadership in running a sustainable, school-specific program with limited Grow Pittsburgh involvement.

As part of the Learning Garden program, Grow Pittsburgh builds new gardens for a handful of schools each spring and fall. Once the gardens have been installed, we host a Kick Off Day celebration with the school to start the growing season. As students arrive, we encourage schools to have a brief assembly or all school announcement to build excitement for the garden. Following the morning announcement, there will be opportunity for four classrooms to come out to the garden, each for a 40-minute block. At that time, each class will help move soil into the new garden beds, plant, and water.

- Experience with social justice education topics preferred.
- Adaptable to changing conditions (e.g. weather, unruly students, cancellations).
- Ability to do physical work in all weather conditions for up to 4 hours.
