

Dear Supporters,

Last year's annual report marked a huge milestone for Grow Pittsburgh – our tenth anniversary. We spent a lot of time reflecting on the growth and past accomplishments of the organization over the course of a decade, and we're proud of how far we've come and the many individuals that have enabled us to get to this turning point.

Now, we are doing a lot of looking forward. Ten years gave us a chance to review and refine our work, and we're happy to share in this annual report some of the ways in which we're adapting to the ever-changing urban agriculture landscape.

We've helped to set up food gardens in partnership with a variety of communities, both geographic and cultural, in Pittsburgh. But we know there are still many more opportunities to create growing space. That's why we've increased our support to new American and refugee communities, many of whom came to this country with agrarian backgrounds and have found food growing to be therapeutic as they adjust to their new homeland. We've also begun working with youth in the juvenile justice system, and have again found that gardens have healing powers that provide young people in distressed circumstances an opportunity to shine.

As you may have heard, we also recently launched a significant effort to bring 50 new school gardens to Allegheny County over the next 4 years. Pittsburgh, and indeed the nation, is continuing to recognize the value of instruction beyond the classroom to increase test scores, establish healthy eating habits, and encourage wonder and appreciation for the natural world.

Our farm sites grew more produce and seedlings than ever before, all while instituting enhanced programming. Planning commenced in 2015 for a new and improved apprenticeship program that, as I write, is employing and training 7 young adults from disinvested neighborhoods where our sites are located.

Last but certainly not least, we were part of a team of advocates last summer that successfully passed one of the most progressive urban agriculture zoning codes in the country, making it easier for everyone to grow food in Pittsburgh.

But while its easier, it's still not easy. And that's why we continue to listen to you, our supporters, in adapting and changing to meet the needs of a rapidly changing landscape and city. We envision a new Pittsburgh where access to growing space is a right for all, and an equitable food system provides every resident an opportunity to eat well. We hope you can help us get there!

WE TEACH PEOPLE HOW TO GROW FOOD

- 96% of school garden program students tasted the healthy food prepared each week in the Winter Cooking Program.
- Harvested a sweet potato in the Pittsburgh Faison garden weighing in at over 3 lbs!
- 200 families and community members helped care for school gardens during summer 2015.
- Spent an additional 308 hours outside with students because of their participation in garden class.
- 1,110 students participated in cooking demonstrations as part of Chef in the Garden events at three school gardens.
- 100% of Urban Farmers In Training participants identified that they have a stronger understanding of where their food comes from.

- 91% of Urban Farmers in Training participants tried a vegetable from the garden that they had never had before and 100% of participants learned new ways to prepare fresh fruits and vegetables.
- 12 garden workshops were taught to over 190 participants.
- Connected Urban Farm Apprentices with 20 local farms and farmers as part of their training.
- Organized the 2nd Youth
 Garden Summit bringing together
 50 youth across the city who spent their summer focused on various food growing projects.
- Conducted 6 garden classes at Shuman Juvenile Detention Center to establish a vegetable and herb garden in a central courtyard as a therapeutic garden site.

WE BUILD AND SUPPORT GARDENS

- Garden Resource Center registration increased 300% in 2015.
- Started 3 new gardens and supported 25 established community gardens throughout Allegheny County.
- Grew over 8,000 pounds of produce at community gardens that went directly to their families, friends, and neighborhood food pantries.
- Gave out 12,920 seed packets, 7,559 plants, and 496 planter buckets to 4,016 people at 4 locations as part of the Great Garden Giveaway with partner Greater Pittsburgh Community Food Bank.


- Expanded the amount of healthy vegetable-growing space in low income communities by over 1/2 acre.
- Reached over 815 participants at gardens through workshops, events, volunteer days, and meetings.
- Residents donated over 3,780 work hours to community gardens.
- Piloted How to Start a Community Garden workshop series.
- Worked with local government to pass one of the most progressive Urban Agriculture Zoning Codes in the country!

WE GROW FOOD

- Installed a shipping container to add secure packaging and storage at Braddock Farms.
- Built a worm bin to create compost for Braddock Farms.
- Started 17,265 organic seedlings at the Frick Greenhouse, including 1689 for community gardens and 971 for school gardens.
- Added a greenhouse so seedlings can be started at Braddock Farms.

- 66 people volunteered 1,018 hours to our farm sites.
- Donated 2,017 seedlings.
- Hosted 28 educational tours at our farm sites including the Shiloh Fall field trip with 80 second graders from Pittsburgh Faison.
- Grew 11,227 pounds of produce representing 82 varieties of crops at Braddock Farms, Shiloh Farm, and the Frick Greenhouse.
