# INTEREST FORM

## COMMUNITY GARDENS PROGRAM



### ELIGIBILITY:

Your garden must be located in **Allegheny County** and on **publicly-owned** land (i.e. owned by a municipality or non-profit). Privately owned sites are not eligible, even if they are tax delinquent and vacant. Potential garden sites outside of the City of Pittsburgh may be subject to eligibility based on the income of the surrounding area. You may contact us to confirm your site's eligibility before submitting this form.

Your garden group must include **at least 6 people** and you must have a **committed partnership** with a local non-profit or your municipality.

### NEXT STEPS:

1. Fill out and send in this **Interest Form**
2. Set up a phone call with a Grow Pittsburgh representative to share more about your project and ask questions
3. If our program is a good fit for your eligible project, we will send you the full **Application**. There are many parts to the application—please give your group sufficient time to gather all the support and information needed, so that you can submit a strong and thorough application by the deadline. You can submit parts of the Application as they are complete.
4. We will schedule a **Site Visit** so we can meet you, see your potential garden space, take soil samples (if not already taken), and offer a brief info session. Be prepared to share the history of the site: what used to be there, and who uses it now.
5. Submit your complete Application by **October 1, 2021** to be considered for a spring build in 2022.
6. We will inform garden groups by November 1, 2021 if they are accepted into the 2022 program.

# Community Gardens

## FOUR PHASES



### General

Once accepted into the program, we work with garden groups for two years to develop the community and garden infrastructure with the goal of achieving self-sustainability. Once gardens graduate from the program, Grow Pittsburgh remains a connected resource.

At least one member of your group must attend our **How to Start a Community Garden** workshop. This class will walk you through the “people side” of starting a garden. We offer the workshop twice a year.

### Phase 1: Engage

To complete Phase 1, you must plan and hold a **Community Meeting** about the garden where neighbors have the opportunity to contribute ideas to the project and get involved.

### Phase 2: Organize and Design

**Organize** your garden group and **Design** your garden.

### Phase 3: Garden Development

Phase 3 is when we build the garden with you, providing materials and educational support. We will work with you to develop **Programming** throughout the growing season and visit your garden every week. You must survey your members and record volunteer hours and harvest totals for reporting purposes.

### Phase 4: Community Garden Network

After your garden graduates from our program, your garden becomes part of the **Community Garden Network**. This network will connect you to other gardens, funding opportunities and resources to keep your garden growing.

**Our goal is to help communities start sustainable food gardens that will be enjoyed for generations to come.**

# Community Garden Site



## IMPORTANT NOTE

Community gardens located in Allegheny County, but outside of the City of Pittsburgh, must be located in a block group that meets certain income requirements to be eligible for our program. Please contact us to verify your eligibility before submitting the Interest Form.

### Site requirements:

- Publicly owned by a municipality or non-profit. Private property is not eligible
- Written permission to use the site for at least 3 years signed by the owner
- Water access or potential for water line installation
- At least 6 hours of sunlight
- Soil lead levels of less than 300 parts per million (to grow directly in soil)
