Your generosity also allowed our staff to reactivate and maintain several gardens that had been neglected due to school closures during the pandemic. Thanks to your funding, more than 25,000 students across Allegheny County were able to experience the many benefits of gardening last year!

2021-22 SCHOOL YEAR BY THE NUMBERS

- 5 new early childhood gardens created in 2021-22
- 2 learning gardens activated with new programming
- 95% of teachers believe spending time in the garden enhanced student engagement in academic classes
- 100% of teachers believe the garden encourages environmental stewardship in students
- 95% of teachers feel confident and prepared to bring students into the garden on their own
- 90% of teachers feel that students experienced physical and emotional benefits from being outdoors
