Grow Pittsburgh and Sampson Foundation have partnered to offer an early childhood garden education program for Early Childhood Centers across the Pittsburgh region. Gardens are outdoor classrooms that are adaptable to most play yards and are designed to fit the space and needs of each center. The program will integrate garden and cooking activities into the classroom curriculum to support the development and education of the whole child. We aim to support teachers in teaching their students how to grow, cook and eat fresh food while celebrating the cultures and experiences of our families and our city. The work of Grow Pittsburgh across the region is driven by the understanding that hands-on, inquiry-based learning has significant positive effects on the development of children and youth.



Grow Pittsburgh's school garden program began in 2007 and during the 2018-19 school year we piloted an Early Childhood garden program through a partnership with the Sampson Foundation. In this program, we work with ECE educators and communities for one year to assist in planning and building on-site gardens. We work with teachers to train and host garden classes throughout the season and align garden classes with the center's mission and curriculum to create a dynamic, sustainable site-specific program.

New facilities will be selected for garden builds and programming will continue for one year. In person programming is dependent on Covid 19 guidelines and safety restrictions. We will work with you to tailor the program to your needs.



Early Childhood Garden Application Criteria:

The application that follows will enable our team to evaluate whether the Early Childhood Garden Program would be a good fit for your Early Childhood Center. **Programs that meet the following criteria will be eligible to be considered for garden builds.**

Early Childhood Criteria:

- □ Complete application (Parts 1-6, including photos) emailed or submitted by postal mail.
- □ Located in Allegheny County
- Early Childhood facility (includes: family, group and center) licensed by the state of PA.
- At least 5 organized and motivated people in your garden leadership group. Groups can include any staff and parents but must include at least three teachers interested in supporting this program. For example, your garden team could include parents, health coordinator, custodian, and assistant teachers. (Exceptions will be made for smaller facilities)
- □ Signatures of support from director and head custodian.
- A suitable site for gardening on the property that gets at least 6 hours of sunlight a day with supporting photos and the completion of Part 3. Grow Pittsburgh can help you with this parts
- ☐ Enrollment of at least 50% of children receiving subsidized funds through CCIS. CACFP, Head Start or Pre-K Counts.

<u>Note:</u> If you don't meet these criteria, please submit as much information as you can and we will try to help you in other ways. Get in touch early and often throughout the process. The more we know, the better we can assist!
