



Position: Greenhouse and Shiloh Farm Senior Apprentice

Deadline to Apply: Monday, January 21, 2013

Organization Description:

Grow Pittsburgh was established in 2005. The organization incorporated as a nonprofit organization in 2008 after four successful programs had been established: *Braddock Farms*, a social enterprise that raises vegetables for local restaurants and provides jobs and locally grown food for Braddock residents; *The Edible Schoolyard*, an elementary school gardening program that uses the seed to table model to educate children about where their food comes from through physical gardens; *The Frick Project*, a greenhouse and garden operation that grows plant starts for local garden initiatives as well as produce for restaurant sales; and *The Summer Intern* program that uses agriculture as a platform for leadership skill development and environmental education. In 2010, the organization launched *City Growers*. This initiative is meant to encourage community vegetable gardening by providing technical assistance in the set up of gardens on vacant land in the city.

Senior Apprentice Overview: For the 2013 growing season Grow Pittsburgh is seeking a senior apprentice for our sites at The Frick Art & Historical Center and the Shiloh Peace Farm at the corner of Thomas Blvd and Homewood Ave in Point Breeze. The senior apprentice will learn varied aspects of vegetable and seedling production from bed preparation to seed starting, harvesting, and marketing.

Timeline: March 4, 2013 to November 1, 2013

Hours and Compensation: The senior apprentice will work 30 hours per week with flexibility to occasionally work late and on weekends. Compensation: \$10/hour

Responsibilities: The senior apprentice will work directly with Greenhouse & Shiloh Farm Manager Cassandra Morgan to learn and execute all aspects of small-scale, sustainable, urban produce and seedling production.

- The spring season will consist primarily of starting seeds in the greenhouse at The Frick, as well as potting, watering, and marketing seedlings. The senior apprentice may be asked to deliver seedlings or attend events on weekends. Spring work will also entail outdoor garden projects including prepping beds, seeding, and transplanting, as well as harvesting and marketing. As the senior apprentice acquires skills and knowledge, they will have the opportunity to work independently on site, while being supported by Grow Pittsburgh staff.

- In summer, the senior apprentice will perform additional seeding, transplanting, harvesting and general crop maintenance. The weekly farm stand and low-income CSA will begin in June; the senior apprentice will be involved with the organization and operation of these programs. By this point in the season, the senior apprentice will be expected to work independently on a regular basis.
- The fall season will include seeding crops for winter in the greenhouse space, along with continued harvesting and marketing. The senior apprentice will assist in clearing and prepping garden beds for winter.

Educational Aspects: The senior apprentice will learn about sustainable urban agriculture through experiencing the growing season first-hand. The senior apprentice will also gain valuable experience in the marketing of seedlings and produce through various sales outlets including restaurants, a farm cooperative, a weekly farm stand and a weekly low-income CSA. Additional opportunities to develop and implement educational programs on each site may be available as the season progresses. There will also be opportunities and funding available to attend relevant workshops in the Pittsburgh area. Topics that the senior apprentice can expect to explore at the gardening sites, throughout the growing season include:

- Pest and disease ID, management, and control
- Identifying and using beneficial insects
- Increasing soil fertility for improved crop production
- Composting
- Utilizing various hand tools for task efficiency
- Sustainable, chemical-free vegetable-growing techniques for small spaces
- Watering techniques and irrigation systems
- Harvesting and crop storage techniques
- Marketing to restaurants, and through co-ops and farm stands
- Planning and harvesting crops for weekly CSA

Requirements: Applicants should have a strong interest in sustainable and organic agriculture, vegetable gardening, and urban farming. Some previous growing experience is preferred. Those interested should be self-motivated, punctual, and attentive to detail. They should also possess a strong work ethic, the ability to follow instructions, follow through on details, and work efficiently. As both of the sites that the senior apprentice will be working on are open to the public they should be open to interacting in a friendly manner with the public on a daily basis. Candidates interested in marketing and outreach opportunities are strongly encouraged to apply. Access to a car would be helpful for doing deliveries, attending events and traveling between sites.
