

SCHOOL GARDENS IMPACT REPORT



Thanks to your generosity, the 2024-2025 school year was a year of growth for school gardens across Allegheny County. Your support helped to create and sustain thriving garden spaces, giving children the chance to grow, cook, and enjoy the magic of fresh food and gardens.

Your support has helped to grow our school gardens network into 74 flourishing gardens, connecting more than 28,000 students to hands-on garden education each year. Your contributions also connected teachers with valuable resources, including lesson plans, recipes, and a community of peers to learn and grow alongside.

2024-25 SCHOOL YEAR BY THE NUMBERS

- **21** school gardens received hands-on active programming with our team
- **4** new school gardens created in 2024-2025
- **100%** of teachers believe gardening enhanced student engagement in class
- **100%** of teachers believe that work in the school garden increased student capacity for teamwork and cooperation
- **100%** of teachers feel that students experienced physical and emotional benefits from being outdoors
- **100%** of teachers believe that children enjoyed trying new foods from the garden
